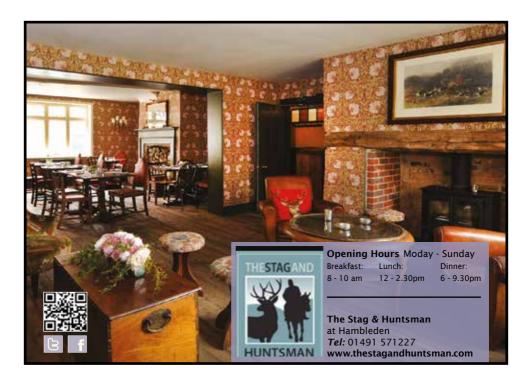

Rachel Wigram continues her reflections on selfisolation on the topic of Facing Fear

Facing Fear

Fear rises up in us when we feel threatened. At its best, it warns us of danger and keeps us safe. To a certain extent, fear is very good for us. But, it can also take hold of us and paralyse us so that we can hardly breathe or think or function.

I have been afraid at times over the last couple of years. Afraid of not being able to cope. Afraid of losing my support network. Afraid about the outcome of medical tests and so on. Sometimes I have felt like I am in the grip of an almighty storm of threat and fear, with dark clouds massing overhead, rain lashing down on me and tumultuous waves surrounding me.

In such times it has encouraged me enormously to know that God understands my fearfulness. The Bible is full of encouragements not to be afraid and to receive peace.

I am reminded of Jesus' disciples on the Sea of Galilee as the wind whipped up the waves around their small boat and the well-founded fear of seasoned fishermen rose up within them. And, suddenly, they saw the figure of Jesus walking on the water. When Peter took courage from Jesus' invitation to come to him on the waves, he kept his poise and balance whilst Jesus filled his gaze.

However, when Peter shifted his focus to the wind and the waves, he plunged into the depths of fear and doubt. Jesus was Peter's still point – the constant, steadying, enabling presence within and beyond the swell and the storm.

There is a lot of fear around at the moment in response to the coronavirus threat. When that fear threatens to overwhelm us, I am praying that we will know first and foremost that God understands. I am praying, too, that we will hear Jesus' invitation to fix our eyes on him and we will discover that God is both with us in the storm and far bigger than any storm – constant, faithful and true.

Hambleden Valley Garden Club

We are pleased to report that the Garden Club is able to resume its winter programme 20/21 in the virtual world. With thanks to Gill Groombridge of the Plant Heritage Society for hosting a zoom

meeting for us, 23 members were able to enjoy a very interesting talk on Miniature and Small Hostas by Jonathan Hogarth. Jonathan holds the National Collection of these hostas and he exhibits at Chelsea and Hampton Court Flower Shows. A small blue hosta with round leaves like a mouse's ear - hence the name Mouse-Ears for these varieties – was found in Japan. Different markings were found in hybrids and sports of the plant and propagation by tissue culture produced alterations and the possibility for design of this hosta. Jonathan showed a delightful array of photos of many different Mouse-Ears hostas. with informative comments, and gave useful tips on the cultivation and over-wintering of these plants.

On Tuesday, 3rd November, Timothy Walker, former head of The Oxford Botanic Garden will give a talk titled 'Paradise Lost and Restored' via zoom. Timothy has visited us at Skirmett twice and is an entertaining and knowledgeable speaker.

WILDLIFE

A nest box with a chime?

November is the perfect time to clear out and clean or put up new nest boxes. I am always delighted to find they have been used to raise the next generation. Empty the contents, pour boiling water inside to kill the mites, turn upside down and leave them to dry outside on a windy day. If you have any wood shavings, I love to throw a handful in before returning the boxes to their East or North East facing locations so any birds using them overnight have something to snuggle into. Nest boxes hung close to feeders are never used, too little privacy and particularly if there are Greater Spotted Woodpeckers around. Supporting our beautiful birds, both native and visitors, through the winter months with food definitely increases their survival rate. A squirrel proof peanut feeder such as 'Squirrel Buster' (there are other designs available) is worth the

investment. A shield descends over the nuts denying access if any furry or feathered body over a certain weight lands on the feeder. Should you wish, the mechanism can be tweaked to prevent magpies, jays and ring-necked parakeets from reaching the holy grail behind the mesh too. Wild birds 'speed eat' the seed mixes but peanut feeders are emptied at a slower pace. Birds need water and while they can find it themselves, if you have a bird bath of some kind within sight of a window, it is a delight to pause and watch robins, blackbirds and others having a drink and taking their daily bath. There are bird boxes available with internal cameras which live stream pictures of the whole process from the first piece of moss arriving to the last little fledging departing along with all the tiny poo sacks being carefully removed in between. On really cold nights, I love to imagine one of my boxes to contain a chime. A chime in this instance being the collective noun for wrens and the record stands at around sixtu having a sleepover in a single, yes single, nest box.

Big Butterfly Count 2020 sees lowest numbers of butterflies recorded in 11 years

Wildlife charity Butterfly Conservation has released data about the number of butterflies counted in this year's Big Butterfly Count (17th July – 9th August 2020). Worryingly this summer's Count has seen a reduction in the average number of butterflies logged per count of - 34% in comparison with 2019 and the lowest average number of butterflies logged overall since the event began eleven years ago. In all, during this year's Big Butterfly Count, over 1.4 million butterflies were counted across the UK.

In decreasing order of abundance the top 10 butterflies were: Large and Small Whites,

Gatekeeper, Peacock, Meadow Brown, Red Admiral, Small Tortoiseshell, Common Blue, Ringlet and Comma (see photo).

The fall in butterfly numbers this summer may be due to a number of factors. An unusually warm spring led many species to emerge earlier than usual so the Count may have only caught the tail-end of the flight period for many species.

Encouragingly, 2020 also saw the highest number of butterfly sightings ever submitted by the general public. It seems that, in a very dark and challenging year, the opportunity for getting out into nature and helping as citizen scientists was very welcome to people who were able to participate in the Count this year.

Butterflies and moths are incredibly valuable indicators of the health of our environment. Their declines show not only the effects of human behaviour on the world around us but also the changing patterns of our weather. As well as being important and beautiful creatures in themselves, they play key roles in the ecosystems of birds, mammals, invertebrates and plants as food, population controllers and pollinators. Their conservation is vitally important.

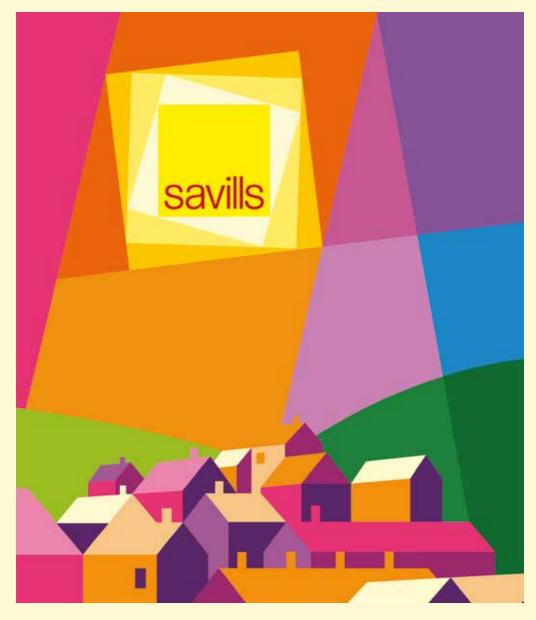

Fawley Past

Alfred Waller's description was so interesting, how he landed up in Fawley to spend 44 years. However, I'm afraid I must put right a couple of things.

I am the only one left of that era to be born there as both dear Harry Sloper and Oliver Cheriton weren't though I grew up with them. The Cherition family came first, in the 1930s, to Crockmore Farm. Ross, Oliver's dad, used to ride a big brown horse and his brothers were Pat and Joe, and I think a daughter, Maisie. Then there was Major and Mrs. Bird with sons Edward and Tommie who lived at Crockmore House, they were very fine cricketers. Sadly, Edward was killed early on in the war, My mother was the village Post Mistress, prior to Mrs Burroughs, on the green for over 40 years. Harry came with his parents somewhere around 1939-1940. His Dad was chauffeur to Lady McAlpine when they bought the house, Benhams. At first they were frowned upon by the local aristocracy as Continued on page 11

they were "In Trade" but they brought life into the Village, and they brought over their Irish labour and built new houses. Harry and my brother, Michael, became great friends but Harry lost a shine for me when the land girls arrived. The School re-opened, when the war started, to take in evacuees, and my mother, though a busy person, took in two; I don't know where we put them but we must have had room. She got up petitions to get a weekly bus, before that we biked everywhere. We sold sweets and cigarettes and later on in the war we entertained POWs as they helped on the land. We held whist drives and dances in the Village Hall for the war effort. We dug for Victory, grew all our own fruit and vegetables of course. I suppose the icing on the cake was being successful in getting the Walnut Tree built. Generations of my father's people lie in the Churchyard, the Rixons and the Peads where one day a little bit of me will be as well. My father was famous for his rose gardens reaching all the way to the front gate, I'm afraid the war didn't affect me a lot - I was young and it always seemed to be summer.

John travelled extensively with Joan and with Jean, visiting South America, South Africa, India, Singapore, Bali, Borneo and many other destinations, returning with videos, photographs and memories.

John had a passion for wildlife and gardening. Anyone who he spoke to soon learned of his early morning walks and sightings of barn owls and deer. He was very proud of his garden and was generous with the produce. Few visitors left empty handed. He was chair of the local Show committee, and holder of 'best in show' many times

John loved his extended family dearly and teased all the children, delighting in capturing them on film.

Life became less social when Jean sadly passed away in 2019, and after being diagnosed with leukaemia earlier this year John still remained cheerful and loved getting out for a walk.

He was a wonderful man and we will miss him dearly.





MEDMENHAM

Reminiscences of Medmenham Post Office

I have lived in Medmenham since 1946, but the family connection goes further back. My Grandfather, Ernest Sartin, a stonemason, came up from Dorset to help build Danesfield Mansion in the 1890s, while his wife – a local woman – took over the management of the village post office and shop. Ernest died young leaving three small daughters, the youngest my mother Olive, but Charlotte bravely continued the business for more than forty years, her retirement eventually hastened by a German bomb falling at the back of the cottage in October 1940, where the large crater could be seen for many years. The village lost a memorable character in Mrs Sartin, famed locally for her racing tips, and for helping some villagers – who had 'left their glasses behind' – in reading and replying to telegrams.

For a few years the business was taken over by Harold and Sadie Morris, the latter remaining active in village affairs for several decades. However, in the 1950s a purpose built post office and shop was opened in Ferry Lane under the ownership of Pamela Plaisted, daughter of the last resident vicar. For many years this venture was run by delightful Scottish sisters, Nessie and Amy Lawson, but a

tragedy befell them when the latter was fatally injured in a domestic fire.

Now marked only by a postbox the business was closed in the early 1970s and, one suspects it had never been profitable. The post office was a godsend to the village, but the shop was too small to stock a wide range of goods and the prices were a bit higher than their equivalents in town. Perhaps more could have been done to exploit the seasonal requirements of summer visitors from the river, but the fatal obstacle was the rapid development of car ownership in the village.

As a schoolboy in the late 1940s and early 1950s I can remember that only about six households in Ferry Lane owned a car; even the vicar depended on a bicycle, and this was true of all the working class villagers, including my parents. However, by the early 1970s, when few truly working class villagers remained, most households had at least one car and some more than one. Long distance travel was now commonplace, including easy day visits to London and commuting to work, so shopping in Marlow, Henley and further afield became the norm.

The reader may well query why the post office and village stores in nearby Hambleden has not only survived but prospered. A full sociological answer cannot be attempted here, but suffice it to say that Hambleden is not on a major bus route and, more importantly, it has historically been a larger and more concentrated village with its own butcher, baker, builder and garage.

Nevertheless, the failure to sustain a post office and shop business in Medmenham must be viewed as a serious loss to the village's character, not only for urgent necessities but also as an invaluable social asset where local people could exchange news and gossip. This deficiency is even more obvious and regrettable during the present crisis of restricted travel and lockdown.
