Group Letter December 2021



Last year I was given an Advent book by John Pavolvitz with the surprising title: Low. John suggests that we often meet Jesus in the low and shadowy places

- like stables and animal mangers - as Jesus stoops to meet us, descending to earth to inhabit humanity. John's words give an interesting perspective on a time of year that can be too busy, too noisy or too quiet, or perhaps too isolated; many of us will have an understanding of that through our lockdown experiences last year.

But the book encourages us to explore these low places, to see Advent as the gift that makes us stop and consider where we are, what we are doing and what we are saying, wherever that may take us; to look at the gifts to be found in surprising places when our own postures are low: in humility, in forgiveness, in those times of challenge.

After last year's lockdown we have the

opportunity this year to explore Advent in a different way and there are many possibilities on offer in the Hambleden Valley Churches this December. well as the wonderful array of carols and other services across the churches. there is also a course on Robun Wrigley-Carr's Advent book, Music of Eternity, selected by the Archbishop of York as his Advent Book of the Year: there is a Wild Nativity on Northend Common on Sunday 12th November and much more besides. Do take a look inside the magazine to seek whatever God may be calling you to explore as part of your journey this year.

Our journey through Advent may help us to embrace all kinds of new places if we allow it. What we learn along the way means that we can approach that low throne of the Christ-child in the straw with new eyes and, from that lowly place, step into the New Year with renewed hope, with renewed love for others, for ourselves and for our world.

May God bless you this Christmas,



St Martin's Voices in Concert Saturday 30th October



On a dark and blustery Saturday evening, concert goers were treated to the glorious sounds of St Martin's Voices at St Mary the Virgin, Hambleden. The professional vocal ensemble, made up of past and present choral scholars from London's famous St Martin-in-the-Fields gave a performance of sacred and secular music on the themes of love, hope, joy and peace.

Congregations across the Hambleden Valley and around the UK had become familiar with St Martin's Voices who had recorded music to broadcast to the nation as the country was plunged into lockdown in March 2020. In that recording the service opened with the hymn Lord of All Hopefulness.

Under the direction of Andrew Earis the sell-out Hambleden concert featured four selections of pieces each introduced by a verse from the hymn. Highlights included *O Radiant Dawn* by James MacMillan, the spiritual *God's Gonna Set this World on Fire* by Moses Hogan, *Ubi Caritas* by Ola Gjeilo and a poignant *The Long Day Closes* by Arthur Sullivan. The hour-long concert ended with Nils Greenhow's version of *Lord of all hopefulness*.

The quality of the singing was exquisite, as one would expect from such a prestigious choir, and the audience's appreciation was clearly visible in their expressions (above their masks). The resonance of the lower voices, the tenors and bass, combined with the rich altos and soaring soprano, particularly in Stanford's *The Blue Bird* were a delight. On leaving the church I heard a group comment they were moved to tears on occasion. My husband and I wholeheartedly agreed and reflected how fortunate we were to hear such world class singing in our local church

An evening of light and joy as the darkness of winter sets in.

Wild Church Remembrance at Fawley

On Sunday November 14th about 150 villagers, in addition to our Member



of Parliament and his wife, Steve and Beth Baker, attended the garden of Last Cottage in Fawley to hear Rev Sue Morton conduct a Wild Church service to commemorate the lives of the crew of a Halifax bomber that crashed at that very spot in 1943.

After we were welcomed by Rev Morton, we sang the airman's hymn to the tune of 'Eternal father Strong to Save'

O Ruler of the earth and sky, Be with our airmen when they fly...

The reading was taken from Micah 4:3-4

He shall judge between many peoples, and shall decide disputes for strong nations far away; and they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; ...

The Last Post and Reveille were played on the trombone by Garrick Steventon. Prayers were led by Guy Andrews, and ten-year-old Hannah Hunt charmed us all with her reading of the poem called 'The Mother'.

Our final hymn was God is our Strength and Refuge, sung to the tune of the Dambusters' March.

The story of the accident is as follows:

On 14th March 1943, Halifax DG283 of 161 Squadron suffered engine failure and crashed at Last Cottage. The pilot was 21-year-old Flying Officer Geoffrey Osborn. The flight had taken off from RAF Tempsford (Bedfordshire) for a secret night-time Special Operations Executive mission to drop supplies to the Resistance near the Swiss border in France, a near 1,000-mile round trip. Its cargo included fifteen crates of homing pigeons. On crashing, the aircraft, carrying a full load of fuel Continued on page 7

for this incredibly long journey, skidded down the slope, hit the trees, and burst into flames. It was the scene of a quite remarkable act of bravery by F/O Osborne, as described in his citation for the George Medal:

In March, 1943, Flying Officer Osborn was captain and pilot of an aircraft which crashed shortly after taking off on an operational flight. The aircraft was soon enveloped in flames and ammunition and verey lights were exploding, Flying Officer Osborn was dazed but succeeded in extricating five injured members of the crew from the wreckage. In so doing he was badly burnt about the hands, arms and face. Though in a state bordering on collapse, he did all he could to ensure that every member of his crew had been extricated before he was finally persuaded to receive attention.

His decoration was personally awarded by the King.

The members of his crew were:

F/O D Thornton – Navigator

F/Sqt Stevens - Air Gunner

Sgt R Poltock - Flight Engineer

Sgt H Shearer - Wireless Operator

Sqt B Crane - Air Gunner

Sadly, Sergeants Crane and Shearer succumbed to their injuries two days later.

A most moving and memorable occasion.

The Skill of Professional Dog Grooming

Regular grooming of your dog helps ensure the coat is kept clean by removing dead skin, hair and dirt, and preventing matting. If left for too long, a matted coat can become painful as the hair starts to pull on the skin when the dog moves.

A typical grooming session consists of brushing, bathing and drying, trimming, clipping or hand stripping into the breed style or owners' preference. The ears are trimmed and checked for infection and the skin is checked for signs of irritation and the early detection of lumps. Any fleas and ticks are removed. Nail clipping helps to prevent tears and painful posture.

There are many tools needed – clippers and different types of scissors for trimming and blending the coat, a height adjustable table, a large bath and dryers. Most groomers will have organic, nontoxic shampoos and specific ones for sensitive skin, allergies, flea control and different hair types. Control straps are commonly used to stop the dog twisting round and sitting down.

Dog groomers also have experience of handling puppies; dogs with behavioural problems and older dogs with health issues, such as arthritis. These dogs should be groomed quickly and competently to reduce stress. A professional groomer will manage your dog gently and competently.

In praise of kingdom fungi



I am fortunate to be a member of the wonderful Frieth Natural History Society – do join us if you are inclined. As such, I received a golden ticket to attend a Fungal Foray in Hatchet's Wood courtesy of Lou Mallin and led by the awesome Richard Fortey, who to my mind is Henley's answer to David

Attenborough. We meandered slowly though beautiful woodland, our faces mostly inches above the leaf litter and stopping every few seconds to have a myriad of fruiting bodies named and explained by Richard. Plenty were colourful, a few had a frilly skirt (an annulous) around their stems, others he described as LBJs (little brown jobs) and required closer inspection; but he knew the names of them all. The final tally was sixty-eight species and thank you to Kate Hussey for recording them. I'm not going to list the bounty but instead use the space to pass on a few things I learnt about the magic of mycology. Mushrooms are the fruiting body of something much bigger beneath the ground called a fungus; there are 1.5 million species of fungus but only about 20,000 produce mushrooms. We passed over thousands of miles of interconnecting mycelium beneath our footsteps in only a few hours. Mycelium are very fine white filaments (in essence the roots of the fungi) and carry nutrients and messages between trees and around the subterranean wood wide web. Fungi break down and recycle the dead wood, plant and animal life in our forests and without it everything would just pile up. Mushroom rings occur because certain fungi grow outwards a bit further every year from a central point so the circle gets wider like ripples on water. The larger the 'fairy' ring, the older the fungus body is beneath it. Fungus comes from Latin and the plural can either be fungi or funguses. Shaggy inkcaps (Coprinus comatus) also known as Lawyer's Wig (see photo) produce useable ink which has enabled signatures on all sorts of legally binding documents including, allegedly, the Magna Carta. I have covered only a minute fraction of what is known about fungi and a miniscule fraction compared to what isn't. Human life depends on our fabulous fungi but unless we look after our planet, we all risk going up in a puff of spores.

Following a poignant silence, the Rolls of Honour for the men who gave their lives for our freedom were read by representatives from the 6 parishes. Lute Concert in Fawley Church on 13th November



The discriminating audience of music lovers packed into the chancel could never have guessed what a feast of music they were about to enjoy. We were privileged to listen to Matthew Faulk, a fine lutenist, who introduced us to compositions for this historic instrument.

The tapestry measures 13ft square and was put together, finally, in their church hall in Deal. The tapestry and all those involved won a community award from the Royal British Legion and raised £4.500 for charity.
