

### Valley Magazine

We trust that life will steadily return to more normal patterns in the months ahead with the Covid vaccines enabling us to worship in our churches and enjoy gathering together and generally regaining our freedoms in all walks of life. The latest omicron variant will mean continued caution but writing this early in December we shall hope that it is not going to be a significant set-back.

You will see from the front cover of January's edition that we are increasing the annual subscription price from £15 to £16. This is due to higher print costs. We continue to strive to offer good value and hopefully you will agree that it is an excellent quality production. The monthly per copy cover charge will remain at £2. We continue to rely on our loyal and extensive range of advertisers who cover a significant share of the printing costs.

Annual Subscriptions: Last year we again encouraged subscribers to pay their annual dues by way of a bank transfer directly into the Group bank account and now over 60% of subscriptions are paid in this way. It avoids handling cash and cheques which has proved especially helpful. We urge you again to please make magazine subscription payments in this way during 2022. When setting up the £16 transfer please show your name and village/location in the reference section. For example, Mr W H Smith of Hambleden would insert an abbreviated "WHSmith/Ham" in this section. Abbreviation may be necessary because there is only space for a maximum 18 characters.

The subscriptions received as bank transfers in January will be notified to the distributors early

in February so they are aware of all relevant receipts. This will be repeated each month. In practice the great majority of subscriptions come through during the first two months of the year which is much appreciated.

### The Rural Review

Following the conclusion of the rural review, our neighbouring benefices, South Chilterns and West Wycombe, will continue to work together and find ways to put the ideas that were discussed into practice. The representatives from Hambleden Valley Churches have opted not to be involved any further for now, although there may be another opportunity for our benefice to join in later, with the benefit of seeing how things have developed with the other parishes.

Nevertheless, the review has given us an opportunity to think about the role of the church in the wider community from many different points of view and the discussions provided much food for thought that is relevant to all of us as we discern the way forward. I share ideas arising from one of the most important focus groups below. We were fortunate to have the input of Toby Long, Schools Adviser for Oxford Diocese, who lives in Ibstone and chaired our group on Schools and young people. To include opportunities meet with school leaders to explore how we can support each other. Educational **Resources** – develop what the churches can offer to all schools in terms of educational and curriculum support. Developing resources for churches to share with schools. Spirituality - Here we focus on collective worship and assemblies. The possibilities of Godly Play, Open the Book and Prayer Spaces. Our invitation for schools. staff, families, and children is to explore Christianity in a non-confessional environment and support everyone on their spiritual journey. School Governance -Focusing on the four Church of England schools who require a high proportion of their school governors to be appointed by the local PCC and Diocese. We want to offer a 'try before you buy' session for those interested to hear from serving governors. ### George Howson MC - Remembrance





On Friday 26th November the sun shone at a Service led by Sue Morton, for the laying of a wreath at the graveside of George Howson, who was responsible for the first poppy factory 99 years ago. The wreath is placed every year on the anniversary of his death by Mr John Newbury from the original poppy factory in Richmond

Major George Howson served on the Western Front and then after the war founded the Disabled Society. The factory making poppies employed disabled war veterans.

In 1922 at the founding of the factory, George Howson wrote "I have been given a cheque for £2000. It is a large responsibility and will be very difficult. I do not think it can be a great success, but it is worth trying"

George Howson's legacy has been monumental.

The single word FULFILMENT is aptly inscribed on his grave.

George Howson lived at the Hyde, Hambleden and it was wonderful that his granddaughter,

Harriet Coleridge could attend with her cousin Mark Westcott who read Psalm 121 after Sue's prayers and blessing.

### Advent Carols by Candlelight in Hambleden

The traditional service of Advent carols and readings by candlelight was held at Hambleden on Advent Sunday, at the end of November. This is a service for all six churches in the Valley. Advent is the first season of the church year and is a time for quiet reflection and prayer, as we look forward to the light of Christmas when God sent his son to be a light living among us.

The service begins with the church in total darkness and silence, symbolising the end of the old year. Light is gradually introduced, symbolising the start of something new.

The Revd Sue Morton brought in the light, from which candlelight was spread through the church and large congregation, by a team of discreet sides people. The two Brians lit the chandeliers in the Sanctuary, the first time since Christmas 2019. The choir sang an anthem and processed in.

The Revd Sue Lepp and Revd Sue Morton had designed and printed a service sheet, so the service could move on without distraction, and the congregation could be immersed in the quiet atmosphere and gentle light, better to focus on the powerful and well-known readings. These were read by a churchwarden from each of the Valley churches, and began with Jeremiah and Isaiah's prophecies in the Old Testament, and moved through others, to Luke and John in the New. These last describing the Annunciation of the Virgin Mary and John the Baptist's preparing the world for Jesus' ministry.

The choir sang beautiful anthems and led the congregation in well known and loved Advent carols

At the end the bright lights came on and we were able to go out into the winter night,

thoughtful, heartened, and looking forward into a new year.

### In praise of the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch 2022

January has arrived and with it a new year for our individual nature reserves, the ones

right outside our front and back doors. There is beauty in nature as it rests during these winter months, muted colours maybe but they are calming and induce me to slow down too. Bird life continues around us unabated unlike the debate on should we feed them or not; I do but it is crucial to clean the feeders frequently to keep them free of disease. The insect world is quiet but showing promising signs of life. Early bumble bee queens have emerged from hibernation in the soil and scour the area, inches from the ground. searching for abandoned mouse nests to use themselves to raise a new generation. Their loud buzz in the crisp, cold silence during this mostly dormant month often takes me by surprise. These large queens need every dandelion, hellebore, pussy willow or other early nectar producing plant to sustain them. Our mature pussy willow (Salix caprea), is a hotspot for these early queens when it flowers: I once counted seven at one time on the lowest branch and goodness knows how many there were on the crown. The flower beds in my personal reserve are filled with an assortment of slowly deteriorating plants in varying shades of umber. The ruddy brown or coffee-coloured stalks of flowers that once graced my kitchen table sway under the weight of finches searching for those last remaining seeds from unpicked flower heads before eventually collapsing to renourish the earth below. Other stems already toppled by a combination of rain, snow and freezing temperatures are tossed about by blackbirds looking for worms. Something feathered searches through the leaves in my gutters for its breakfast causing soggy specimens to cascade down past my windows reminding me I haven't vet cleared them. At the end of January, the RSPB hold the annual Big Garden Birdwatch to monitor populations. It is an hour of your choosing out of a weekend counting the birds you can see in your garden and registering the tally online. I inevitably find my blackbirds, long-tailed tits and wagtails have scarpered elsewhere during my Continued on page 17



#### Fred Simmons Article 2

The Simmons family at the Gables increased with the birth of Eric Thomas (1903), Percy (1905) and Cecil (1908) and all attended Frieth school next door. A school photo from



1905 shows Hilda, Walter, Fred, Beat and Charles. My father Fred, with brother Walter, is in the back row holding a cricket stump. (The headmaster's fondness for sport probably inspired my father's sporting interests). Beatrice wears a long pinafore and Charles a large lace collar. My father left school in May 1910 having been awarded the Bucks CC Certificate of Proficiency at 5th standard. The certificate notes that a child must be 13 before he can work. In the 1911 Census, father Charles is noted as a 44-year-old hard wood turner in a chair factory making church furniture. Four children are in school with the voungest at home. Walter is a furniture maker and Hilda, 17, a domestic servant in Hyde Park, London. My father, 13, has no occupation noted, presumably having left school seeking work. By the 24th November 1911 he had started a 5-year apprenticeship at North and Son's, Piddington. It provided for 2 weeks fixed holiday a year with a five-and-a-half-day week. A long way on the bike each morning!

But by 1914 things change. Brother Walter joins up followed in 1915 by Fred. I still have a copy of Mr North's letter of 16th November when my father joined the guards. "Dear Young Friend, I am sorry that duty calls you away from our factory ... Give the Germans as many bullets as you can". On the back of a postcard showing the 1st Life Guards in full dress, to which he now belongs, he tells his mother that he is sending his clothes to Marlow Station to be collected. He has seen Hilda, as he is at Knightsbridge Barracks and not far from her in Hyde Park. He reassures his mother he is "having good food and not much work".

W. corner of the parish, St. Bartholomew's, is a peculiarly interesting and perfect example of a village church – the massive Early Norman western Tower, dating from the 11<sup>th</sup> century – being essentially typical of the continuity and placidity of English country life and feeling."

The Rector of Fingest, George Augustus Baker (1841-1866), expressed his thoughts on the tower in a poem, "The Old Church Tower (Fingest)", written in 1856.

### The Old Church Tower (Fingest)

When on yon old grey Tower I look,
Standing in that sequester'd nook,
Where, by the will of providence,
Has been my humble residence,
I never of the prospect tire,
I never weary to admire
That singularly lofty pile
Of Saxon structure, where awhile
Friar and monk were wont to pay
Their superstitious vows, to pray
To Saints and Virgin, till a Creed
More pure than Rome's did here succeed.

I love to stand on vonder hill And my imagination fill. As I look downward on the scene With visions of what there have been. Thro' a long course of centuries flown, Th' events of history unknown. Oh! had that Tower the power of speech, Had it a spirit that could teach: How much of wisdom might we learn, From its revealings, how discern In the sad tales it might narrate Of what had often been the fate. Of the ungodly, -- ample cause For the observance of God's laws. Esteeming it a warning giv'n As though it were a voice from Heaven. Oh! when my body with the dust Shall mingle, as ere long it must, May it beneath thy sacred shade Thou old grey Tower, in peace be laid! While my freed spirit still shall see, And seeing, shall delight in thee.
