

Hambleden Valley Garden Club

In January members enjoyed a delightful talk by John Anderson, Keeper of the Royal Gardens, which comprise the Savill Garden, Valley Gardens and the private garden at Frogmore, all part of the Crown Estate attracting six million visitors a year. The gardens have an exceptional number of ancient and champion trees and several National Plant Collections including Magnolias. Rhododendrons and Ferns. John gave a brief history of the garden established by Eric Savill, the Valley Gardens which were cleared of undergrowth mainly by ex-servicemen after the Second World War and the acquisition of the Rhododendron Collection of J.B. Stevenson of Tower Court which took five years to move.

John showed a wonderful and extensive array of photographs of trees, plants, themed borders and specifically designed gardens, giving a very detailed and interesting commentary. Issues that were also raised were imported pests and diseases, notably the

caterpillars of the Processionary Moth, and the effect of climate change on present and future plantings.

On February 1st, Russell Bowes, Garden Historian, will be giving a talk titled 'Miss Jekyll's Gardening Boots' which features seven gardeners whose careers cover the last 250 years of gardening in England.

He came when our hearts were dark, confused, constrained by covid.

Unmoved by pleas, by shouting, cries, he looked down, it seemed, with disdain, refusing to budge from that ridge, regarding their efforts in vain.

They left at last when darkness came.

Next morning he was gone.

I had no idea where he went but it seemed as if he had won.

Later I heard he was captured in a garden two miles away, lured back then to his peahens but at least he'd had his day.

And I shall always remember that moment his colours broke through like a wave, lifting my heart with the glow of his green and his blue.

Frog Marching through Fawley

It is February and thousands of amphibians will be slowly stretching their limbs beneath the leaf litter in the woods alongside Benhams Lane. They are ectothermic creatures which means they don't generate their own body heat and to get through winter they bury themselves into the soil and hibernate. Fawley hosts one of the largest annual amphibian migrations in the UK with a total of 8820 toads, 344 newts

and 234 frogs recorded in 2020. Their route is downhill through Benhams Woods to Oaken Grove, straight across the Marlow Road and onto their spawning pond on the other side. To ensure most of them make it,

a barrier several hundred meters long and half a meter high is erected just inside the Oaken Grove boundary fence beside the Marlow Road, running from Benhams Lane into the show ground field. The barrier and road are patrolled for several weeks by eagleeyed, torch wielding volunteers from Henley Toad Patrol clutching buckets, who tread carefully while gently gathering up every clammy individual. When the bottom of the container is obscured by sprawling limbs, it's off to the pond where each species is counted and recorded. Male toads frequently leap atop a female en-route often guaranteeing a lift all the way to the water. As dawn breaks, they crawl under leaves or logs to hide from daytime predators such as pheasants, kites or buzzards and someone checks the barrier for any creatures stranded after the previous evening's volunteers departed. The trigger for this astonishing wildlife event appears to be the approach of Spring, an evening temperature of 7 degrees or above, darkness and preferably the heavens opening. They don't dawdle, they race, particularly on nights when the undergrowth is awash with rainwater and their path is in effect 'oiled'. Their urge to procreate is strong and usually takes them back to the place they were born. Once spawning is completed the adults return via the same route back to the woods. Incredibly, in July the Marlow Road is covered in thousands of newly emerged teeny tiny baby amphibians who somehow know which direction it is back to Benhams Woods from the pond – HOW? Female frogs often have a crimson blush during the breeding season as my photograph shows in contrast with the toads next to it. The term frog-marching heralds from the late 19C when four police officers would each hold a limb of drunken or disorderly prisoner effectively moving the detainee belly-down!

It's Timmy Willie. The timid hero of *The Tale of Johnny Town-Mouse* falls asleep in the carter's hamper and, after terrifying adventures in town, declares he prefers country living. It seems he prefers country living in my house.

Quite why his preferred route is from the back door to the vintage speaker in the sitting room is unclear. Perhaps he's hoping for a quick spin of Adam Faith or Roy Orbison after a satisfying lunch beneath the bird table.

My mother wrote Nature Notes for this magazine and loved all wildlife. When she eventually needed a carer, a despairing entry in the journal read: "Molly put food down for the mice in the dining room again tonight". If only Timmy Willie were house trained, he would be most welcome. As it is, there is nothing for it but *traps*.

The method is effective but not carbon neutral: "humane" plastic tubes containing peanuts are set along his route. It's no good taking captives all the way down Watery Lane for release in the morning. They're back by teatime. They must be taken further afield in a windowless van

For Janis, her death was a blessing and a happy release into a Freedom so long denied her.



Fred Simmons Article 3



Frieth Cricket Team 1928 believed at their ground at Parmoor

My father would never talk about his experiences in the First World War. I still have his well-thumbed photo of his mother taken at Sweetlands in High Wycombe. On the back is written "If this card should get lost or anything happen to the bearer, please return to Mrs C Simmons 'The Gables' Frieth, Henley on Thames". Like so many, in August 1918 he was diagnosed with influenza. But a month later he was back

in action, His younger brother, Charles, also then joined the RAF on 4th October 1918. On 15th November Fred was home on leave, only to then suffer a recurrence of the influenza, complicated by bronchial pneumonia. By early December he was in the Canadian hospital at Taplow, later convalescing in Devon prior to being judged "A1 fit" in March 1919. The last record of his war service was of the Household Battalion dinner in June 1919 for which I still have the

Following war service, Fred returned to North's as a cabinet maker. Brother Walter retrained as a teacher; Charles became involved in the aircraft industry as a woodworker. Fred recalled that his pay packet went straight to his mother, Annie, who would then return him his "pocket money". Annie also worked to supplement the family income, possibly as a "chair matter", as she was before her marriage. Youngest brother, Cecil, became the only child from the family to go to Grammar School later training as a teacher

Then, in the 1920s, Fred's sporting activities took off. He and brother Eric were part of North's relay team winning the 1920 chairmakers' cup. They had cycled to Loakes Park for the event. He is also pictured with Wycombe Harriers and a shield for 1922-1923. He had seven Henley & District Football League medals including runners up in 1926-1927 and winning the Henley six-a-side tournament the same year.

His brothers were also sportsmen, for the 1928 Frieth Cricket Club photo includes Percy, Walter, Cecil and also Fred as Vice-Captain.

But the Simmons family's time in Frieth was drawing to a close, as the next article will reveal.
