Group Letter for June 2022



Celebration is in the air at the beginning of June!

There will be street parties snaking along the lanes, highways and

byways of the country as we celebrate with joy and thanksgiving Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee. Our neighbours upriver at Goring and Streatley are aiming for the longest street party in the country and many churches are learning the new anthem *Rise up and Serve* which has been written especially to celebrate Platinum Jubilee: it is a brand new contemporary anthem, featuring the Commonwealth Choir and Friends, some singing of God in their own language.

People speaking of God in their own language, at the equivalent of another street gathering - this time in Jerusalem – also occurred 2000 years ago at Pentecost, the birthday of the Church, when there was a call to the crowds to rise up and serve and follow Jesus. Pentecost too falls this year on Sunday 5th June – do gather with us for our Group Service at Fawley at 10am as we celebrate both

these events!

Gathering people together is one of Queen Elizabeth's gifts: with over $1\frac{1}{2}$ million people attending her garden parties; answering over $3\frac{1}{2}$ million items of correspondence; as Supreme Governor of the Church of England liaising with seven Archbishops of Canterbury. She has found many ways to rise up and serve.

The Queen began her reign with a simple request, just before her coronation in 1952, for prayer from the people: "Pray for me ... that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life". Decades later, following the challenges and the joys of her long life, she has written: "I have been - and remain - very grateful to you for your prayers and to God for his steadfast love, I have indeed seen his faithfulness."

May we too pray for ways we can rise up and serve God and one another in this month of June, and to know his faithfulness.



GROUP NOTES AND NEWS

The Rural Review. A reflection

On April 28th 130 people gathered at Rackleys, a beautiful converted barn at Cadmore End, to celebrate and reflect on the review process we have been conducting for the last year – thinking about how the parishes of the three adjoining benefices of Hambleden Valley, South Chilterns and West Wycombe operate, and how we can learn from and help each other.

It has been an encouraging process, but not without its frustrations. These are around the 'head in the sand' approach that some parishes take. While the review demonstrated what lovely and committed people there are in these churches and communities, it is an unavoidable fact that our church families are failing to connect with not only the younger generation but in many cases the middle aged one too. Change is coming and we can either get ahead of it or be overwhelmed by it. One way or the other, things are not going to stay the same.

Our rural church buildings were built for a rhythm of worship around church services, on Sundays, in our own parish. While these are an important backbone to our church life we have to find other ways of reaching out to people who currently don't attend church. Options, some of which we are already exploring, include weekday services, gatherings outside the building such as Wild Church (which takes place every month in the Hambleden Valley), the use of the building for other community activities, and so on. 'Friends of...' organisations allow people to support the building at the heart of the community even if they are not churchgoers themselves. Another option is for our benefice to partner with larger groupings to find the critical mass for events and projects that are normally

only the preserve of large churches in urban settings. Many social action projects, such as Lane End's Community Matters, depend on the support of the wider area, and we have all seen the power of group action to help others both during lockdown and now as families from Ukraine begin to arrive in our area. Following a world changing pandemic, and with many crises at home and abroad. we should be striving where possible to do whatever we can to meet the needs of our neighbour. Rather than adopting a defensive, inward-looking approach to the unprecedented challenges facing many of our rural churches we simply must look outwards, and work together in order to remain open and flourish. The long-term fruitfulness of the rural review will therefore depend on how far

I have been asked several times what the point of it all was, and whether anything will change as a result. I have thought long and hard about this and concluded that the outcomes we may have hoped for at the beginning, which I would describe as formal cooperation (for example, hiring a youth worker or a buildings officer to work across the benefices, or organising events, especially for young people, to which all parishes would contribute and attend) may not happen, at least yet.

we can nurture the green shoots of trust

and cooperation that have begun to grow

among the 14 parishes- and beyond.

Conversely there are wonderful things happening in a more organic fashion, which I believe will grow and flourish. A recent example is the fledging music group which is being formed across the patch to bring young musicians together in a 'travelling band'. How wonderful is that? Just getting to know each other better has resulted in exchanges of ideas at every

level, and we are beginning to compile our 'database of skills' to share details of recommended contractors for church maintenance. It remains a goal to employ contractors for regular maintenance tasks common to all churches, such as the annual gutter cleaning. This would be efficient in terms of both time and money, ensuring well maintained gutters and enabling the church team to get on with their vital work and outreach.

At Rackleys the Bishop of Oxford heard a presentation which highlighted aspects of particular significance to the future of our churches, including 'schools and young people' and 'community outreach'. Toby Long, Church Warden of Ibstone and Schools Advisor for the Oxford Diocese spoke in his usual passionate and inspiring way about how we can get involved with our local schools -whether we are members of church congregations or not, and even if the school is not in our parish. He would, for example, love to hear from anyone who might like to find out more about becoming a school governor. Alison Rimmer from West Wycombe talked about community outreach, which surely must be the starting point for everything we hope and pray for. Her talk gave many examples and provided us with ideas as to how we could all improve our church's connection with the local community.

Although we set out with the intention of finding the common ground between our parishes and benefices, a strong lasting impression was of the unique and precious character of all our parishes. For example, just within the Hambleden valley our churches all have very different characters, reflecting the demography and history of our villages, church buildings and people. The discussions we had on mission emphasised the primary

importance of building on what we are already doing well, and each church has a unique opportunity to further develop fellowship in their own parish. The presentations from all 14 parishes were eye openers- something that one parish found hard seemed to be achieved effortlessly by another, and vice versa. We were all inspired by the example of Fawley bringing their prayer group to life during lockdown, and now working to reorder the interior of their church, the community outreach of Hambleden with their regular summer teas in the church porch, and the walkers' café and annual visit from St James church in Hackney in Fingest, to name a few local examples. We heard about Lane End's 'kitchen in a cupboard', the strong relationship between school and church in Ibstone, the marguee that Radnage erects in the summer next to the church to enable events to take place, and so on.

This type of initiative has always been an important feature of church life but following the pandemic and the changes abruptly forced upon our communities there seems to be a new spirit at work. We all agree on the importance of hanging on to the good things that were born of necessity during that time-connecting on zoom, spontaneous outdoor prayer groups, the WhatsApp groups offering support to each other that have now become part of our way of life. All things, ironically born of being forced to stay apart, that drew us closer together.

This sense of a new spirit was reflected in the view expressed by Bishop Steven in his talk at Rackleys, of which I summarise the introduction as follows: 'We have come to the end of our own resources and cannot strategise ourselves out of where we are without engaging with God. Deep spiritual and theological renewal is needed to breathe life into dry bones. We must observe how Jesus restores the sad, tired disciples walking to Emmaus. He begins by walking with them, even though they were walking in the wrong direction, away from Jerusalem. As we continue to come to terms with the consequences of the pandemic, we are encouraged to make space to listen to each other, seek deeper engagement with God in many ways but most of all discerning the risen Christ in Scripture, waiting for meetings with God that will bring renewal'.

The rural review provided us with a valuable reflection on the state of our churches and by sharing openly with the other benefices we forged new relationships and identified strategies that we might usefully adopt. However, as Bishop Steven told us, now is the time to seek that 'deep spiritual and theological renewal' that will bring all this to life in our precious churches and communities and set us on the right road for the future. good of all humanity So how fitting that we all gathered in David Emmett's field just down the road from Rockwell End House Farm.





WILDLILFE

In praise of the female red-tailed mason bee (Osmia bicolor)

Way back when I could still do handstands, I briefly watched a bee going in and out of an empty snail shell but sadly I didn't realise the significance at the time, strolled on and missed a spectacle I have ached to find again ever since. It was almost certainly a female red-tailed mason bee. a rarely seen individual that repurposes empty snail shells for her offspring. She is very distinctive with a black head and thorax and a bright red abdomen. The species likes chalk and limestone grassland or open woodland, with a sunny aspect and is active from April to July. The males hatch first and wait impatiently for the females to appear a week or two later and mating takes place. The female then searches for vacant snail shells. They seem to like Cepaea, the stripey ones but use others too: location of shell maybe more important. She spends time orientating her chosen specimen into the perfect position for stability and access. The number of cells created within and separated by chewed leaf pulp appears to vary from one to several perhaps dependent on what stage of life she has reached. Each cell contains an egg provisioned with pollen gathered from wildflowers such as bird's foot trefoil, horseshoe and kidney vetch, ground ivy, dandelions, dead-nettles and daisies. Female eggs are laid initially and males nearest the entrance so they can exit first. Finally, she carefully seals the entrance with mud and masticated chalk. But she

doesn't stop there. She camouflages the shell by decorating it with yet more leaf pulp. But she doesn't stop there either. Now the 'thatching' begins. Thirty or more pieces of dead grass, plant stems or tiny twigs are sourced, flown in and manoeuvred into the perfect position over her precious shell to hide it from predators. During this process she often looks as if she is riding a broomstick! It is thought she repeats the entire process with four or five shells before dying. Apologies for letting emotion get the better of me but can you imagine if after all her hard work, her creation in both senses, is cleared, mown or strimmed to oblivion? I am forever tossing empty snail shells into sunny unmown sites here, hoping I get lucky and some land in locations these industrious females find desirable. I don't have a photograph as yet but do please have a look at @jwentomologist's YouTube video https://www.voutube. com/watch?v=O-mAM0P5SrA.

FINGEST Fingest Past

The Local Carriers (3) – Great-uncle Amos Prince featured as the local carrier in previous articles, Fingest Past, June 2018 and October 2019. In the early 1920s, in addition to his horse-drawn carrier trade, Amos was operating motor bus services between Stokenchurch and High Wycombe and from Fingest to Henley. In the mid to late 1920s Amos Prince sold his bus business to the Thames

Valley Traction Co. Ltd. They operated a route, service number 37, from High Wycombe railway station via Lane End to Fingest. In order to provide an early morning workers service from Fingest the

bus was garaged overnight at Fingest in what was known as a Dormy Shed. A number of crews manned the service, all living locally in order to arrive at the Dormy Shed to begin the morning shift at 6am. Children living in Turville Valley and Northend would cycle to Fingest to catch the bus to secondary schools in High Wycombe, leaving their bicycles at Ivy Cottage or Fingest Farm. The Dormy Shed was sold and dismantled in 1977/78.



The Frieth to Henley-on-Thames Post

In the 1980s, in the absence of local buses, the Royal Mail provided a service from the Hambleden valley and surrounding villages to Henley. The tickets were postage stamps franked by the driver. This provided a minibus service for the residents of the Hambleden Valley, while at the same time the driver collected mail from post boxes on the way. Later a supermarket ran a limited bus service to their shop in High Wycombe. A subsidised service

to Marlow and Henley-on-Thames was provided, for a while, by Bucks County Council.

What was Medmenham like in the early 1900s?





Charles Scott Murray of Danesfield

Lord Devonport

The Scott Murray family had been established at both Hambleden and Danesfield in the 19th century. Their tenants and estate workers would likely have moved around the area. However, in 1844, Charles Robert Scott Murray converted to the Roman Catholic church, resigning his seat in parliament a year later. Whether the two were linked is unknown, certainly local sectarian

tensions were then rife, nearby Lane End being something of an anti RC place, as evidenced by its involvement in the petitions to parliament a little later in the century.

Charles Robert Scott Murray died in 1882 and his son, Charles Aloysius, sold up Danesfield in 1896, but remained at Hambleden manor. Old money was making way for new money. The Danesfield estate was split, Danesfield House and the Abbey bought by Hudson the soap maker, Wittington House bought by Hudson Kearley, later Lord Devonport, the owner of International Stores.

Major building works took place (remodelling of Danesfield, building of

Wittington House, refurbishment of the Abbey) between 1896 and the 1st World War. This may explain the influx of building trades into the area at the time.

Hudson and Kearley seem to have been bitter rivals and Hudson seems to have been on the losing end generally, selling up both Danesfield House and the Abbey in the first decade of the century.

Sir Douglas Dawson then took on the Abbey, Arthur & Mrs Hornby Lewis buying Danesfield House in 1910.

Other people of independent means also moved into the village in this period, including the Misses Dalton (orphans of a Cumberland cotton manufacturing family) into the old Manor and Onslow Secker (a retired tea planter) into Wood End House. This influx of the wealthy may explain the fact that numbers of local people started to figure in the later census as servants rather than the agricultural labourer category that predominated in earlier years.

As the drum beat to war started, the village and the surrounding countryside saw extensive military exercises, involving an incident on a temporary pontoon bridge across the Thames at Medmenham in 1913, recalled vividly by my grandfather, the ferryman. But in 1914 all was to change, as war engulfed the world.
