But then, tucked away in the middle of the list, one phrase stood out: 'We will welcome you with respect and kindness.' In an unfamiliar place, far from home, the invitation to be welcomed with respect and kindness drew me.

And so I found my way to St James in Monterey where I was indeed welcomed by this small congregation of about 20 people led by a house for duty priest (it was beginning to sound familiar!).

Following the service I was invited for coffee in the beautiful 'old' wood-panelled spiritual centre next door - built in 1918 - where people sat on the veranda and chatted. I

discovered that they too had introduced Zoom Church during lockdown and they were most interested in our 'old' churches here in the Hambleden Valley!

But their welcome didn't end there. For this tiny congregation open the doors of this centre to the community: church groups; support groups for those struggling with addiction; homeless women gathering monthly for meals and a place to stay, and much more.

In some ways our ancient village churches are quite different from this city church across the ocean. And yet in some ways they are so similar.

During the month of August we will have the opportunity to welcome even more visitors than usual into our churches; some may be far from home. They are often a 'hidden congregation' sitting silently in empty churches that echo with God's peace, enveloped by prayers past and present and welcomed simply by the church door being open.

May we too welcome all with respect and kindness - for in doing so we will not only bless others, but we too will be blessed.



# Wild Church!

# **Reflective Litter Picking**

We say Wild Church takes place whatever the weather, indeed it was scorching hot for our July service. Despite floppy hats we sought out shade for our readings and prayers, reflecting on God's creation and righteous anger.



Then we walked around Hambleden village to collect litter; it is surprising how much can be found when you start looking. A sign of the times were the discarded face masks that have become a part of our lives over the last two years, and a multitude of sweet, crisp, and drink packets.



In my personal experience as a farmer, I am most alarmed by the modern menaces for animals found around our fields and





hedgerows. These include Chinese lanterns, helium balloons, dog poo bags and the glass canisters that nitrous oxide (laughing gas) comes in, usually with alcohol bottles, these can all leave fatal consequences for wildlife and farm animals.



After litter picking, refreshments were welcome in the cool of the church where we made a butterfly montage, a rabbit and hedgehog with collected litter! The Wild Church Litter installations are on display in Hambleden Church, as we support Bishop Steven's campaign to care for the environment. Do come along to see them. It can feel overwhelming, the amount of destruction mankind has inflicted to God's

# A Jewel in the Parish



A little-known jewel in the heart of the parish is the Lady Ryder Memorial Garden. Hidden away beside St Katharine's, Parmoor, its acre of walled seclusion originally fed the House, which was then owned by Lord Parmoor. The estate was sold after the war but the walled garden became increasingly neglected until it was completely derelict, with all eight of the

original glasshouses beyond repair and parts of the walls themselves in danger of collapse.



Then, 10 years ago, Anne, Lady Parmoor, decided something needed to be done. With the support of the Sue Ryder Prayer Fellowship trustees, owners of St Katharine's, she gathered together a group of local volunteers and set about clearing the ground and raising the very necessary funds. Work commenced immediately. Sir Terry Wogan officially opened the Garden and soon organisations like the Wycombe YMCA and the Old Tea Warehouse were encouraging volunteers to come once a week, with the bonus that they could be taught towards City and Guilds, Horticulture, which several achieved. One went on to a degree in Cyber Security and another, on passing a module, exclaimed "For the first time I feel intelligent". That makes all the broken backs and broken spades worthwhile.

It was not long before fruit and vegetables were again being supplied to St Katharine's and sales of "veg boxes" and later a weekly sales stall (Wednesday) were growing in popularity. It works well and the garden looks beautiful. A new greenhouse has been installed, an Education Centre built, much wall restoration work undertaken, new gates built, water and power supplies run in, and, just last year, a Sensory Garden was designed and built specially for everyone

with mental or physical disabilities to relax in and enjoy. Next year we will have a new vine house, keeping the 100-year-old vines and providing wonderful new covered space to teach in.

And we need it. In recent years the Garden has been reaching out to charities like "Talkback", who support adults with disabilities, and schools for children with special educational needs. Three come regularly and others are queuing up but we do not have the resources to accommodate more vet. The benefits of a secure environment, fresh air, exercise and a little learning rewarded with a "Certificate of Achievement" are incalculable. 'Payback from one of the schools was the splendid "visitor" in the photo shown in last month's magazine! The delight all our children show (although some have profound learning difficulties) is extraordinary. Their pride in watching a sunflower they have planted grow, their joy in running a wheelbarrow up and down, their satisfaction in raking up a pile of leaves - all these things mean so much

Do come and have a look on any Wednesday. You will be very welcome and there will be vegetables and fruit for sale straight from the Garden. And you might even be tempted to join in.

And a youth said, Speak to us of Friendship.


And he answered, saying: Your friend is your needs answered. He is your field which you sow with love and reap with thanksgiving.

### WILDLIFE

In praise of the Chalkhill Blue butterfly (Polyommatus coridon) and Horseshoe Vetch (Hippocrepis comosa)



With luck, you may come nose to antennae with a chalkhill blue butterfly this month. The males have powder blue upper wings and are known to gather in groups and their penchant for animal faeces maybe unsavoury but the minerals and nutrients contained therein are considered to be

key to irresistible pheromone levels and consequently their reproductive success. The females have chocolate brown wings with a sprinkling of blue on the upper body and furtively float along inches above soil level. Both sexes have what is known as a chequered border because black veins cross the white fringe of their wings right to the edge. Horseshoe vetch is the sole foodplant for their nocturnal caterpillars who have a mutually beneficial relationship with ants. The caterpillars exude a glucose and amino acid laden honeydew for the ants in exchange for protection from predators not just as caterpillars but also at the chrusalis stage where the ants make them little earthen cells. How amazing is that? Chalkhill blues prefer sheltered south or west facing slopes on chalk or limestone with fairly short grass and where, aside from horseshoe vetch, there is an abundance of nectar rich wild flowers such as scabious. knapweed, wild thyme, thistle and bird foot's trefoil. Horseshoe vetch seeds have been purchased, propagated and plugged in considerable quantities all over the valley in the hopes of attracting females this year. Even I have three, firmly protected from rabbits and deer and I have examined them for caterpillar damage but sadly they look pristine. There is a degree of competition brewing over this – who will be the first to spot a female on their patch as opposed to males on a fly past. Lepidoptera legend Nick Bowles from Butterfly Conservation who leads fascinating butterfly ID walks all over the Chilterns has been lured to the Hambleden Valley later this month. He can tell at a glance the difference between one butterfly and another flitting past at speed and anticipation is high he will chalk up some chalkhill blue females. At some point I will attempt to propagate seed collected from my three treasured horseshoe vetch specimens and planting any successes I have on top of or near ants' nests. Actually,

it occurs to me that maybe the reason the females stay so close to the ground is because they are actively looking for ants' nests? You read it here first, she writes laughing.

# **Putting nature first**

Late summer's hazy days of gold and bronze are when hedgerows and woodlands come back into their own as vivid summer show stealers start to fade. Seeds and fruit ripen, and wildlife starts to prepare for the colder days to come: the late summer days are still full of life and activity.

What you might spot:





Foxgloves -This woodland flower can be spotted until September everywhere from moorlands to roadside verges. In its second year, flowers can grow to 1.5m high.

Bats - By September, many youngsters are now weaned and out flying, racing to put on weight before hibernation. Meanwhile, adult bats are turning their attention to breeding again.

Dragonflies - Abundant and widespread until the Autumn, these iridescent predators rule over wetlands, woodland glades, and garden ponds feeding on flies, midges and



even each other!

For almost 60 years, the Chiltern Society's volunteers have been on the ground across the Chilterns protecting the green and blue spaces that birds, bugs and beasties call home. A lack of resources available to manage nature projects, from Commons to hedgerows, makes the role of the charity and its partners critical. Careful management of these spaces means that collectively they can make a huge difference to our struggling wildlife by providing sanctuaries and by acting as a connected network across in our towns and countryside.

Last year the charity's volunteers gave over 75,000 hours of their time to protect the landscape and its wildlife for future generations. Its Conservation Volunteers at Marlow and Kingwood Commons restore and maintain the network of open glades that support a wide range of important heathland and acid grassland species. These are important sites for biodiversity and heritage, and an irreplaceable asset to the local community. And its Path Maintenance Volunteers help keep the areas footpaths open and in good condition. They improve the network from Henley to Marlow and beyond, so we can all enjoy the countryside and the huge health benefits of connecting with nature.

As development pressure spirals, nature disappears and the impacts of climate change affect us all, the Chiltern Society relies on the generosity of its members and



# FINGEST Fingest Past

**Schooling (1)** -The Rector of Fingest, the Revd. Thomas Delafield, brought the idea of a school to Fingest. In 1740 an agreement was made between the Rector, churchwardens and the parishioners for Church House to be converted into a school house. Later in 1751 the Rector, the Revd. Francis Edmonds, endowed Fingest with £15 per annum to assist in the education and clothing of six deserving boys and girls in the parish. At this time the parish of Fingest included Cadmore End. Bolter End. and Lane End. In the second half of the 19th Century a Church of England school was built by public subscription in Turville which opened in 1873. Children living in Fingest then attended Turville school until

it closed in 1983. Local children now go to either Frieth Combined or Ibstone Primary Church of England schools.

# MEDMENHAM Harry Gutteridge

Last time I talked generally about Medmenham before WW1.

But what took my grandfather, Harry Guttridge there as wheelwright, carpenter and ferryman at the Abbey?

Harry was born in Lane End in 1878, where his father Charles was the foundry blacksmith. A trained wheelwright and keen sportsman, Harry remained there marrying West Wycombe girl, Emily Hobson, in 1902 and starting a family there.

The Medmenham connection was his grandfather, Robert Guttridge, estate carpenter for Scott Murray in the late 1800s. Robert came from Hambleden, where his 1st wife, Emma, died, leaving him with 3 sons. Robert soon remarried, to Ann, a member of the Meakes family, blacksmiths at Lane End. By 1871 he was at Danesfield Lodge with his new family. Harry's father, Charles, was by then working as under gamekeeper

at Swyncombe with his maternal aunt and uncle.

My grandfather always told the tale that his father ran away from Swyncombe to Medmenham, and this now makes sense, as it transpires that his aunt and uncle split up around this time. So, what more natural than that Charles should return to his father. And what more natural than that his stepmother should place him as blacksmith at Lane End.



Sir Douglas Dawson and Harry Gutteridge So, there were family links for Harry with both Hambleden, where his own great grandparents William and Mary were still living into the 1870s, and Medmenham, where his grandfather's family lived.

Harry and Emily did not move directly from Lane End to Medmenham. They first moved briefly to Hambleden, where their next two children, Joseph and Hilda, were born in July 1904 and November 1906.

In the 1911 census Harry and Emily were

living in Abbey Cottages, Medmenham where their 4<sup>th</sup> child, Harry, was born in May 1909. This puts Harry's move to Medmenham between November 1906 and May 1909. At that time his step grandmother, Ann, was still living there as were her daughters, Jane Kirkland and Charlotte Sartin.

This was a time of change in Medmenham. The Ferry Hotel was still there (just) when he moved, but Harry worked for Sir Douglas Dawson, a Victorian General and Courtier who had the Abbey at the time.

Harry had arrived at Medmenham, where his family would remain into the 1950s.
