Group Letter October 2022



Words of sorrow, loss, sadness and thanksgiving have been said, prayed, written and sung over the last few weeks following the death of

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The books of condolence in our churches here in the Hambleden Valley have contained words of tribute from people in our villages and from people as far away as Canada and Australia.

One person wrote: 'There are no words, only sorrow.' And that it true, our sadness has been expressed in other ways too. Bells have been rung - muffled, unmuffled and half-muffled - or simply tolled; flags have been lowered; flowers quietly and lovingly arranged. 

Commemoration Service for the life of HM Queen Elizabeth II at St Mary's Hambleden September 11th 2022

While we all love our village churches it is a particular blessing that, at momentous times such as these, we are able to join together as a Benefice in St Mary's Hambleden. We owe huge thanks to the Churchwarden, Jill Steward, and her team as well as Christine Wells and the choir for preparing at very short notice. Rev Sue Lepp also thanked the bell ringers and flag bearers for everything they have done in the last week in unprecedented times for us all. About 90 people from all age groups and every corner of the valley were present.

The service itself was beautifully put together by our clergy team: Rev Sue Lepp, Rev Sue Morton and Rev Andy Storch, who is with us for the month of September to gain experience of rural ministry. It put into words and music the many conflicting emotions we are all feeling at this time, and the readings, from Lamentations 3, Psalm 121, 2 Corinthians 4:16-5:4 and John 6: 35-40, reminded us of the faithfulness of God even when faced with this saddest of reminders of our human frailty.

Therefore, we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal.

2 Corinthians 4:16-18

The service ended with the singing, for the first time for many of us, of God Save the King. Many of those present found this the most poignant moment as the reality of the new era, and the passing of the old, began to sink in.

St Mary's Hambleden, September 11th, 2022

Lamentations 3:22-26, 31-33

Psalm 121

1 Corinthians 4:16-5:4

John 6:35-40

We come together today to recognise that this is a time of great change and historical significance in our country and around the world. The news has constant commentary. Many people carry grief which events like this bring to the fore. There is fresh grief as we mourn the death of a beloved and faithful Queen. There is joy at the proclamation and accession of our new King.

Where do we go with this? It can be difficult to find time to reflect on all that has happened in only a few days. Not many people seem to know the rules of modern-day mourning (if there are any); we are not sure about what is appropriate to do or not do.

A priest posted on a Facebook group to which we belong, about popping into the village bank on Friday afternoon. A man confronted him and shouted, 'why aren't you in the church?! The Queen has died!' The priest engaged in a conversation with the man about the events of the past day. It turns out the man was also upset that the village hall had cancelled bingo that evening. Wait - what?

My prayer is that this morning we can come together to lament the sadness of her death and remember with gratitude all that she was to so many. Also start to get our balance back! The readings were suggested by the Church of England for today. Each of them has the common threads of: time, being lost, life changing and God's faithfulness.

Thinking back to Thursday feels like years ago. Everything seems to be happening so fast; keeping in mind that we are mostly spectators to the events going on in Scotland and London. It is difficult to fathom what is happening in the eye of the storm and how those in the inner circle are actually feeling. Yet the plans for this time and event have been in the works for years, if not decades.

Time moves on and so do we. It feels like it is moving fast but there are no more minutes or hours in a day then there was on Wednesday. Lamentations, Psalm 121, and 2nd Corinthians each speak of time changing. God's mercies are new every morning. God is watching over us day and night, Our inner nature is being renewed day by day.

When someone we love dies it is normal to want the world and everything to stop. To sit still for just a moment. I am not convinced that time heals all wounds. Healing often requires rest and sitting still. This is not what time does! Time waits for no man and no Queen. Even in the deepest grief, God is watching over us and we are changing. Go slowly if you need to but keep moving.

Even if we feel lost, God is not

Sometimes we do move in the wrong direction and can get lost; physically, spiritually, emotionally. Despite all the protocol, instructions and the immaculate planning of Operation London Bridge we still feel adrift in all of this. Again, very easy to do in the midst of grief and uncertainty. Many people have been surprised at the emotion that has surfaced in the last three days.

The pilgrim in Psalm 121 is having a hard time; he is far from home. Likely travelling to Jerusalem for a major feast. This should be a time of celebration with family and friends. Instead he has found himself in the physical and metaphorical wilderness. He has not given up though. He does some very sensible things: he stops, he looks up and rediscovers that his help comes from the Lord, who made

heaven and earth. Chin up! It takes all of two verses for this realisation. The pilgrim then spends the next six verses reassuring his fellow pilgrims that God is with them too! He changes from my to your.

In 2000, The Queen decided to speak more about her personal faith in her Christmas Messages and she has ever since. That year she said, "For me the teachings of Christ and my own personal accountability before God provide a framework in which I try to lead my life".

I am bold enough to say that this is the greatest gift that she left us. This is what likely underpinned her life and gave her the strength, grace and fortitude to do all that she did. So, when the changes and chances of her life came, she was on solid ground.

Life changes but God's love is steadfast

Change has come quickly in line with protocols and in some ways it feels cold-hearted. Not only here but in the colonies as well. My sister, a lawyer in Calgary, told me of her utter shock at turning up at the Court of King's Bench on Friday morning! Wait - what?! Never have pronouns changed so rapidly. Do you remember the last time you sang God Save the Queen? I am glad that I did not know it would be the last time but I am now saddened that we won't.

Her Majesty was our rock, she has been described by multitudes of people as a constant in their lives. Her consistency runs through the multitude of interviews like a golden thread. It is true that she was the only monarch that many people have ever known.

Her image has been on millions if not billions of coins, bank notes and stamps; her portraits hung in government buildings the world over. She had the wonderful gift of making people feel seen and heard. She was there when we needed her. At home with us on Christmas Day, at the races, on the balcony, on the telly during Covid when we needed her

non-anxious presence and messages of peace. She loved us and we love her.

However, she was a rock that was temporary. As we all are. In the words of The Committal, 'For he knows of what we are made; he remembers that we are but dust. Our days are like the grass; we flourish like the flowers of the field...' We want people to last though; at least longer than us. Looking in the mirror every morning, this earthly tent, is not the material of eternity.

Paul is talking about our home in heaven that is permanent; not a flimsy, fleshy tent that we walk around in now. Do not lose heart, Paul says at the beginning of 2 Corinthians, even though it is all changing, we are being renewed day by day. Better things are ahead, eternity in heaven. This takes some imagination but much better than holding the notion that there is nothing beyond this life.

God is Faithful in all things

How do we know that there is more beyond this life? God is faithful in all things. Lamentation speaks of the steadfast love of the Lord never ceasing, his mercies are new every morning. There is a quality to this love, it is not fleeting or fickle. John's Gospel speaks of the long-term will of God that all should be raised up on the last day. God is faithful. When we stand on and in the faithfulness of God, we can love fully and be fully loved.

We are overwhelmed with commentary from the news channels and social media. Many pundits are getting their day! I am not sure if that makes it better or worse? It is at least distracting. However much we watch it, it will not sustain us ultimately. Only Jesus can do that; I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

Much of the commentary is about her virtue and seemingly endless capability in the role of monarch, the influence of her parents and sister, and her marriage to Prince Phillip. All very good and great things. Ultimately though it was her faith that sustained her. She was faithful to us because God was faithful to her and she was faithful to God.

I am going to end with some borrowed words from my friend and former tutor, the Revd Dr Michael LLoyd...

Her whole life was characterised by unfussy, unflashy, unfailing faithfulness. Her whole life pointed in the same direction, and therefore had integrity and impact. It also made her a reassuring symbol of reliability and dependability. Her Majesty prayed this prayer as she prepared for her Coronation:

Into thy hands, O Lord, we commend ourselves. Be with us in our going out and our coming in. Strengthen us for the work that thou has given us to do. Defend us with thy heavenly grace, that we may continue thine for ever and daily increase in thy Holy Spirit more and more, until we come to thy everlasting Kingdom; though Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

She has now come to the Kingdom. We give thanks for her, we mourn with the Royal Family in their grief, and we pray for our new King, that he, too, may have God's help in all that lies ahead.

God Bless You.



The Royal Flight

In 1997, while working for British Airways. I was asked if I would co-ordinate and lead The Royal Flight for the Queen's State Visit to Thailand. The trip was 7 days, flying Her Majesty and Prince Philip to Bangkok and then home again a week later. My duties included choosing the cabin crew, attending a briefing with the RAF royal flight and becoming familiar with the Royal china and all the special items that accompany Her Majesty when she is travelling. The story of the experience of a lifetime would take too long to share here, so I have chosen three occasions that show the Queen's sense of humour, her concern for others, and her amazing knowledge of the world.

As well as various Trade and Overseas Ministers travelling, the Queen's Ceremonial Band, 50 or so young men, were seated towards the back of the Boing 767. The cabin crew had lots of fun looking after them over the two 15-hour flights and there was a great deal of swopping stories and laughing. After flying back into London, the Queen made enquiries into how the Band found the flight. It was their views that mattered to her and why I received such a lovely letter of thanks.

When we landed at Bangkok there was a red carpet laid ready on the tarmac. On seeing this Her Majesty turned to the Duke and said that she had asked for no carpet to be used as she deemed it unnecessary. Stopping a 767 is a joint operation between the Captain and



the engineers on the ground and as we sailed past the red carpet the Queen found it very amusing, laughing with the Duke.

On our return flight the Queen read every British newspaper that had been flown out for her. Most she turned the pages over stopping occasionally to note an article. She then completed the crossword in one of the broadsheets in a matter of minutes. When later in the flight we passed over a city shown in the dark sky by its lights, she remarked to Prince Phillip that we were passing over Karachi. I went into the flight deck to ask the Captain where we were to be told we had just flown over Karachi! We were flying at approx 7 miles high and at night. Her knowledge of the geographical world was amazing.

My final memory is being presented to the Queen by her Equerry in the First Class Cabin as the plane was descending into London. I gave my best curtesy and received a gift from Her Majesty. After we had landed Lady Susan Hussey, who was Her Majestu's Ladu in Waiting at the time, asked me if I would mind swopping my box of orchids, that I had bought for about £3 at a street market. for the beautiful orchids that the Thai Royal family had given to the Queen. And that is how my Mum had a huge display of orchids, fit for the Queen, in the front window of her cottage in Pangbourne.

While events after Her Majesty's death were unfolding rapidly on the national stage, Wild Church on 11th September drew reflection and remembrance gratefully together within the peace of the local landscape. Gathered in a





chalk scrape at Colstrope Farm, Sue Morton led us in commemorating the Queen's reign both in prayer and in planting. Under Maria Spink's encouraging guidance, young and the not so young scrambled over the rough scree to tuck up increasingly rare perennial wildflowers, such as harebells, horseshoe vetch and slender bedstraw, in order to attract back our disappearing butterflies, most notably the Chalk Hill Blue and Adonis Blue.

What better celebration of Queen Elizabeth II's life and love of God's creation than that the natural beauty of the Chilterns, nurtured by generations past, should be restored and enshrined here, unfolding its glory anew across a longer, ecological, time-frame.

Our thanks to Mike and Maria Spink for their generosity in enabling the visit and sharing their compassion for the countryside.

Regenerative Farming

The editor asked if I could share with you what we are doing at Colstrope Farm. We are part of a new breed of farmers working with nature – to improve soil health and biodiversity in the Chilterns especially recognising our dependency on the planet for our food and wellbeing; it's called Regenerative Farming.

Why? Because biodiversity, the environment and animal welfare are critically connected to human wellbeing. Soil health is key to success. The Earth's soils contain about 2,500 gigatons of carbon; and we can 'sink' more damaging CO2 underground from the atmosphere if we improve soil health. We avoid ploughing because it releases carbon in the soil back into to the atmosphere and in the process also kills microbial life, depleting soil health further. Post war farming is very much a result of subsidies and the way the big agro-chemical companies pursue profits at the expense of depleting nature both above

and below the ground.

How? Regenerative Farming has clear principles including full plant recovery before re-grazing, shorter grazing periods that reduce parasite exposure in animals, actively encouraging species diversity on land and minimising and ideally eliminating the use of all chemicals. We allow plants to regrow and set seed in between grazing periods. If the fields are not overgrazed, plants are tall enough to photosynthesise and continue to sequester carbon. We take the best practices from preindustrial farming and combine this with the advantages gained through better machinery and scientific knowledge. In the process we grow the most nutritional and happy cattle who live in their natural environment.

We have planted herbal leys to provide richer swards with deeper roots that give nutrients both below and above the soil. This year we experimented with our first 'no-till wheat crop' drilled directly into the herbal ley. "No till" is another regenerative practice eliminating ploughing and instead drilling the seed directly into the ground which reduces soil erosion and increases soil biological activity and organic matter.

Our pilot crop yielded well with a traditional wheat variety grown without ploughing, no herbicide, no fertilizer. Absolutely nothing was added nor much rain either! This regenerative practice is all about eliminating the expensive and damaging inputs of herbicides and fertilizers. Luckily for us we have an expert



HAMBLEDEN Hambleden Church Roof Repairs



Over the last 18 months much planning, greatly assisted by Paul Webb's knowledge of the church, and his advice, has enabled us to get to the point where we can begin essential repairs to the roof of Hambleden Church.

At the end of September you will see preparations for this taking place, such as the delivery of materials and the erection of scaffolding.

The work on the roof will begin in early October when we receive the Bat licence.

About one quarter of the roof area on the north-east side (see plan and photo) will be re-tiled, with handmade clay tiles. For a while they will look new, but will weather in time.

The existing tiles on the northeast side have become porous and crumbled with age and weather, and therefore not waterproof. Other parts of the roof need similar work in the near future, but this part is the most urgent.

Scaffolding will be put up around the east end



of the church. We are told that we will be able to hold services as usual. The Chancel and Sanctuary may appear gloomy because some of the windows will be boarded to prevent accidental damage to the stained glass. The works should take about two months. Wet or stormy weather could mean that it takes a bit longer.

'Save our Churches' have given us a generous grant of £100,000 which will cover all cost of this most urgent phase (estimate £91,000). We are most appreciative of this, and to those who raised this money in recent years.

Future repairs to the roof are likely to cost approximately £70,000 at current prices. Once the first phase is completed, we will make plans for the next stage, and for the necessary fund raising.
